Instructions for Inductions

The days before your induction

Make childcare arrangements

- While children are allowed on Labor and Delivery, you are encouraged to make childcare arrangements for when you go into labor.
- o If you do bring children to Labor and Delivery, all children under 18 years old are required to have a caregiver supervising them at times. This cannot be the patient.

Plan your visitors

- Limitations
 - Hospital staff have the right to ask visitors to leave at any time if needed for your safety
 - If you do bring children to Labor and Delivery, all children under 18 years old are required to have a caregiver supervising them at times. This cannot be the patient.
 - If a patient is under isolation precautions they are allowed 1 visitor and they must remain inside the room with the patient throughout their stay
- How many visitors can you have
 - While in the Triage area: 1 visitor ≥ 18 years old is allowed
 - When in a Labor Room: visitors are allowed
 - While on the mother baby unit:
 - 0900-2000: 2 visitors are allowed (this does not include the children of the patient)
 - 2000-0900: 1 visitor is allowed that is \geq 18 years old (children must leave)

The night before your induction

Medications

- Tell your OB provider all of the medications you take including herbs and supplements
- o Talk to your OB provider about what pills you can take the night before and morning of your induction

The morning of your induction

Don't forget

- Your military ID card <u>REQUIRED</u>
- Leave all of your valuables at home (wallet, purse, money, jewelry, etc)
- Remove all jewelry before arrival (earrings, rings, ALL body piercings, etc. Plastic tongue piercing spacers are NOT allowed). Any rings that cannot be removed will be cut off.
- o Remove all makeup, nail polish, fragrances, lotions, oils, deodorant, etc
- $\circ\quad$ DO NOT wear your contact lenses, leave them at home and bring your glasses and case
- Bring your CPAP/BIPAP machine if you have one
- Snacks (hours for food services are limited)
- Phone chargers

The labor and delivery nurse WILL CONTACT YOU when it is time to come in

- When they do, come to Labor and Delivery Triage on the 6th floor Mountain Side
- o A small meal after you are called is recommended, often times in labor you may only have a liquid diet
- o If you feel sick (ie COVID symptoms, etc) please inform the nurse when they call you

• Your induction could be delayed or rescheduled

Unfortunately, we cannot plan when babies come. So sometimes, our rooms fill up and we have to delay your induction. However, conditions requiring induction have a "window" for safe delivery (usually around a week).
 Be assured, we will get you in for your induction before your "safe window" is closed.



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After your delivery

- Discharge
 - O Typically, if this is your first delivery you will be discharged 46 hours after your delivery. If you have had babies before you will be discharged 24 hours after your delivery.
 - O You must be able to eat, drink, walk around, and urinate before you go home.
 - O Please be aware, some medical conditions do require a longer admission.

When you go home

- Tips for healing
 - o Chewing gum after delivery can help wake up your digestive system
 - Moving frequently keeps your blood flowing and helps prevent blood clots
- When to call your OB provider
 - o You feel like you are getting worse instead of better
 - o Unusual vaginal bleeding or discharge
 - o Temperature of 100.4F or higher
 - o The feeling of chills and you are shivering
 - o Wounds are becoming hot, red, or more painful
 - Continuous vomiting
 - o Trouble urinating or it burns when you urinate
 - o Dizziness or you feel like you are going to pass out / faint
 - Bad diarrhea (loose, watery)
 - O Pain or swelling in your foot, ankle, thigh, or calf (back of leg)
 - Headaches or visual changes not resolved with tylenol
- Go to the closest emergency room if you have... (the emergency team will call your TAMC team after they have evaluated you)
 - Difficulty breathing
 - Chest pain
 - Severe stomach pain
 - O Vaginal bleeding soaking more than 1 pad in an hour
